David Troxel, MPH, is an internationally known expert in Alzheimer's disease and memory care. An informative and engaging speaker, David holds a Master's Degree in Public Health from Rutgers Medical School (now UMDNJ/Robert Wood Johnson Medical School). David has co-authored five influential books (most notably, *The Best Friends™ Approach to Alzheimer's Care*) relating to Alzheimer's disease care as well as staff development and training. David's "Best Friends Approach" is built on a simple premise: people living with memory loss need a friend – a best friend. David teaches caregivers how to understand and fulfill this "Best Friend" role with unique caregiving techniques and tools. He lives in Sacramento, California, and works as a writer, speaker and consultant.



Daniel Kaufer, MD, is an Associate Professor and Division Chief of Cognitive Neurology and Memory Disorders at UNC School of Medicine. He is also the Director of the UNC Memory Disorders Program and Co-Director of the Carolina Alzheimer's Network. He graduated with his M.D. degree from the University of Wisconsin in Madison. Dr. Kaufer completed his internship in internal medicine at Montefiore Hospital in Pittsburgh, PA, his residency in Neurology at University of Pittsburgh in Pennsylvania and his fellowship in Neurobehavior and Geriatric Neurology at UCLA.



Jeffrey Iliff, PhD, is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Anesthesiology and Perioperative Medicine at Oregon Health and Science University and was a part of a University of Rochester Medical Center team that discovered the brain cleansing system named the "glymphatic system." His TED Talk entitled "One More Reason to Get a Good Night's Sleep," viewed more than 3.5 million times, tackles sleep's importance to brain health. The Paul G. Allen Foundation awarded Dr. Iliff an Allen Distinguished Investigator grant for Alzheimer's Disease Research.

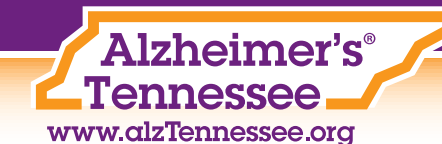
