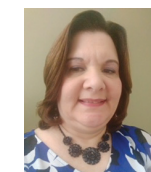

Gregory A. Jicha, MD, PhD, is a professor in the Department of Neurology at Sanders-Brown Center on Aging at the University of Kentucky (UK) in Lexington, KY. He holds the Robert T. & Nyles Y. McCowan Endowed Chair in Alzheimer's research at UK and is the Director of the Clinical Core of the UK, NIA-funded Alzheimer's Disease Center. He is the principle investigator at UK for the National Alzheimer's Disease Cooperative Study Group and also serves on the Clinical Task Force and Steering Committee for the National Institute of Aging Alzheimer's Disease Center Program.
